1. England:

- The NHS has launched a cross-sector ADHD taskforce and committed to investing £2.3 billion annually by April 2024 to expand and transform mental health services ([NHS England](#)) ([Gov UK](#)). However, specific funding dedicated to ADHD and autism services remains significantly lower than required.

2. Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland:

- These regions follow the UK government's overall strategy but face similar challenges in funding and resources. Each has integrated ADHD services into broader mental health funding plans, but specific allocations for ADHD and autism remain unclear and likely insufficient.

Detailed Analysis of Funding and Resource Allocation

1. Financial Shortfall:

- **Autism Services:** The £11.5 million allocated for autism services over several years is drastically inadequate compared to the estimated £300 million required to assess the current backlog of 100,000 individuals ([GOV.WALES](#)) ([UK Government Publishing Service](#)). multidisciplinary teams (MDTs) are needed. With the current capacity of around 20 teams, it would take an estimated 50 years to clear the existing backlog ([The Independent](#)) ([LearnDisToday](#)).

3. Systemic Inefficiencies:

- Bureaucratic delays, inconsistent service delivery models, and a lack of coordinated care further exacerbate the crisis. The current system is not equipped to handle the surge in demand, leading to prolonged waiting times and inadequate support for individuals and their families ([National Autistic Society](#)) ([National Autistic Society](#)).
